The biggest regret you wish you could **amend...** Not meeting John Wayne. He was my hero. I used to rent his boat Wild Goose [a WWII mine sweeper Wayne converted into a yacht] and whenever we spoke on the phone we'd say we should get together, but it never happened.

The temptation you wish you could resist... I'm a chocoholic and love chocolate cake, but it piles the pounds on.

The book that holds an ever**lasting resonance...** Jerry Lee Lewis's biography His Own Story. We've been friends for years. He's a hell of a character, larger than life.

The film you can watch time and time again... Red River, a Western with John Wayne and Montgomery Clift from 1948. I was ten

when my dad Thomas took me to see it. I must have watched it 50 times.

The pet hate that makes your hackles **rise...** Bullying. It's disgusting.

The person who has influenced vou most... It

was an old guy called Bill who I worked with at the paper mill when I was 17. He'd heard I could sing and said, 'If you've got talent you need to die trying to make it.' By the time I was 21 I'd left.

The figure from history for whom you'd like to buy a pie and a pint...

Lord Nelson. I'd warn him, 'Don't wear that coat with all those medals - it'll make you a sitting duck!'

The treasured item you lost and wish you could have again... My healthy right knee. I used to love running six to eight miles a day but I started having knee trouble in my fifties. Now I'm 75, running is a no-no.

> The piece of wisdom you would pass on to a child... Speak your mind, but do it with respect for your elders.

The unlikely interest that engages your curiosity... I'm fascinated by British history, par-

ticularly the Victorian industrialists. I don't know how they could feel good about making so much money when their workers were on starvation wages.

The unending quest that drives you **On...** To keep singing until the end. I know in my heart my voice is a gift from God, and without it I don't know

what would have become of me. The poem that touches your soul... Kipling's If... I love the line, 'If you can

keep your head when all about you are losing theirs and blaming it on you...' I'm always calm as I love what I do and I don't feel I've actually 'worked' since 1962.

The song that means most to you... My Mother's Eyes, sung by George Jessel. My mum Freda used to sing it so it always reminds me of her. I cry every time.

The misapprehension about yourself you wish you could erase... That I love being a knickers magnet! I'd prefer that it stopped, but I wouldn't want to upset the fans. The first time it happened was very sexy, but then it lost its meaning.

The event that altered the course of your life and character... My life was totally changed when It's Not Unusual became a global hit in 1965. I had no money, but suddenly I was able to buy a house and a car and move my wife Linda and son Mark from Wales to be with me in London.

The crime you would commit knowing you could get away with it... I'd make assisted suicide legal if it was genuinely used to help a friend in need.

The way you would spend your fantasy 24 hours, with no travel restrictions... I'd

have a champagne breakfast in Champagne itself in northern France, with scrambled eggs and caviar. After that, I'd fly from France to Britain in a Spitfire. I was born in 1940, so I'm fascinated by

the Battle of Britain. I'd fly back to France to meet my family for lunch overlooking vineyards in Bordeaux. My wife would make it even though she has emphysema and doesn't travel. Also there would be my son and our grandchildren Alexander, 32, and Emma, 28. I'd have escargots followed by
