if he really liked Ginger Rogers. The piece of wisdom you would pass on to a child... Life's not fair – but it's good! My mum Joan, who's 83, always said that

> when I whinged. The unlikely interest that engages your curiosity... I'm obsessed with Christmas – I get it from my dad. I'm a control freak at decorating the tree!

The treasured item you lost and wish you could have again... A bear called Ted that Dad bought for me when we moved to Libya when I was five. Dad was in the Army and was stationed there. Ted vanished at boarding school when I was 15.

The unending quest that drives you on... To make my parents proud. I know they were disappointed when I messed about at boarding school - I didn't revise for my O-levels and only passed four out of nine, and

one of those was needlework! I had to do re-takes and ended up with seven. I've been trying ever since to make up for it. I know Dad was proud of me before he died, and I know mum is now, but it is still something that drives me.

The poem that touches your soul... Wilfred Owen's Dulce Et Decorum Est. It's such an angry poem and it woke me up to the futility of war.

The misapprehension about yourself you wish you could erase... That I'm posh. People say it often and it makes me smile because I'm from a very working-class background.

The event that altered the course of your life and character... When I was 22 and my boss at Westcountry Television, where I was training to be a floor manager, asked me to audition as a continuity announcer for holiday cover. The job changed the course of my career.

The crime you would commit knowing you could get away with it... I'd catch anyone being cruel to animals and give them a taste of their own medicine.

The song that means most to you... Crazy Love by Michael Bublé. When Eamonn and I were courting it became our song and it was the first dance at our wedding in 2010.

The way you would spend your fantasy 24 hours, with no travel restrictions... I'd wake up with Eamonn at The Table Bay Hotel in Cape Town and eat as much as possible from the all-inclusive buffet, with lots of frothy coffee. Then we'd go to the top of Table Mountain. Later I'd take my mum to Singapore. I was born there and haven't been back since I was six months old. We'd have a

gin and tonic in the bar at Raffles Hotel and I'd listen to her stories of her time with Dad there. I'd meet Eamonn and our son Jack, 13, for a Cornish pasty for lunch at The View Cafe in Rame, Cornwall, then go for a walk with our dog Maggie in Whitsand Bay. I'd take Jack, my sister Julia and my niece

> The happiest moment you will cherish forever... Getting our rescue dog Maggie four years ago. She's a crossbreed and looks like a little black fox. I wasn't sure about getting a dog, but she's brought so much happiness.

> The saddest time that shook your world... The day Dad died in February 2011. I thought I was prepared for it because he'd been ill with Alzheimer's for ten years, but it hit me badly.

> The unfulfilled ambition that continues to haunt you... To play a piece of classical music on the piano. I had lessons at school so maybe I'll go back to it.

> The philosophy that underpins your **life...** Honesty is the best policy. Besides, I'm a terrible liar.

> The order of service at your funeral... I'm claustrophobic so I'll be cremated. As the coffin goes behind the curtain, I want them to play Ev'ry Time We Say Goodbye by Ella Fitzgerald, which Dad used to play to Mum on the piano.

> The way you want to be remembered... As the best friend you could ever have.
