The piece of wisdom you would pass on toachild... I was a lonely, geeky bookworm of a child and it wasn't easy.

The poem that touches your soul... Any by the 17th-century 1st Duke of Newcastle. I spent four years studying him for my PhD and they gave a peephole into his world. They're often quite rude!

The misapprehension about yourself you wish you could erase... That because I don't want to have children I hate them. I've just wanted to do other things.

The event that altered the course of your life and character... Becoming Chief Curator of the Historic Royal Palaces in 2003. It's my dream job.

The crime you would commit knowing you could get away with it... I'd steal Victoria's Small Diamond Crown from the Crown Jewels and wear it to a party.

The song that means most to you... It Had To Be You by Michael Bublé. It always makes me want to get up and dance in a swaying jazz style.

The way you would spend your fantasy 24 hours, with no travel restrictions...

I'd wake up in 1802 in a Georgian mansion in Bath. My cook would bring me breakfast in bed - scrambled eggs with mushrooms and builder's tea. I'd go for a morning swim in the Bath thermal springs before flying back to the present day to meet my husband Mark for a walk in the Austrian Alps. We'd go to Barbados in the afternoon and have fish

for lunch on Crane Beach with a glass of sauvignon blanc, before a snooze in a hammock under a palm tree, listening to the waves. In the evening, we'd have Manhattan cocktails at the Algonquin Hotel in New York, then listen to jazz in the Oak Room. Dinner would be in the great kitchen at Hampton

Court Palace where I work. I'd get our Tudor cook to roast a joint of beef and serve a feast for my friends and family with plenty of red wine. I'd end the day in the magnificent velvet four-poster bed at Houghton Hall in Norfolk.

The way you want to be remembered... She made history enjoyable.
