Digging by Seamus Heaney resonates deeply because it's a poem for writers. My father Tom, who's 85 now, is a poet and it reminds me of him.

The event that altered the course of your life and character... When the first film I'd directed, A Very British Gangster, was selected for the Sundance Film Festival in 2007. It brought me into the world of cinema and directing and it woke up creative juices I didn't know I possessed.

The crime you would commit knowing vou could get away with it... I'd hack into the computers of local authorities and cancel all the parking tickets - then re-assign them to the jobsworths who issued them.

The song that means most to you...

Bridge Over Troubled Water by Simon & Garfunkel. It was written against the backdrop of the Nixon White House and the Vietnam war. It's a song of protest and resignation and tears well up whenever I hear it.

The unending quest that drives you

On... I'm driven to help underdogs or the oppressed who can't get justice.

The way you would spend your fantasy 24 hours, with no travel restrictions...

I'd wake up in the Arctic to a glorious pink sky. I've spent over three months there in total and it's an extraordinary place. I'd then go for a geothermal spa in Iceland to thaw out, before brunch in New York with strong coffee. After

that I'd go for a walk in the desert of Sharqiya Sands, Oman. I lived with the Bedouin tribe there and the people are wonderful. I'd eat fresh dates in the shade. I'd spend the afternoon sailing off Belize, dropping anchor to snorkel over coral reefs. At sunset, I'd drink whiskey on the banks of the Mississippi in Louisiana

while listening to Cajun music and enjoying home-cooked food. My evening would be spent on the Sepik River in Papua New Guinea, staring at the Southern Cross constellation in a clear sky. I'd return home to Ireland to bed and sleep to the purr of the Liffey.
